



1936 Jacobean English Cottage Builder: Capital Bldg



- Most common style in Yalecrest (53%)
- Categories
 - English
 - Period Revival Cottage
 - Post WWII
- Roof shapes: gable, hip, cut gable
- Windows: Asymmetrical window placement
 - Small window panes either double hung or casement
- Material: All brick or brick with wood siding on side gables
- over-scaled chimneys decorative brickwork
- Doors arched, half round or square with decorative window insets



Bungalows

- Second most common Architectural style in Yalecrest (17%)
- Popularized in 1920's
- Types
 - ❖ Arts and Crafts
 - ❖ Neoclassical
 - Prairie School

Bungalow: Arts and Crafts (Craftsman)





1912 red sandstone, brick, shingles 2nd oldest house in Yalecret

- Oldest Bungalow style (1860-1920)
- Informal artistic naturalism movement
 - -value of simplicity, utility and beauty
 - -Greene and Greene bungalow, William Morris
- 1-2 stories rectilinear straight lines
- Roof: Low pitched, graduated-pitched gabled roof
 - -Large covered front porch support columns
 - -Exposed roof rafters or beams
- Windows: decorative art glass, 2-4 grouped double hung or casement often with glass transoms header
- Materials: brick, stucco, river rock, clinker brick, quarried stone, shingles
- Detailed wood trim
- Functional floor plans, low ceilings

1924 Carl Wright, builder

- 1-2 stories with rectilinear lines
- Elaborate covered front porch with strong support columns
- Roof: Low pitched, graduated-pitched gabled roof
- Windows: Symmetrical double hung windows
- Materials: brick, stucco





Bungalow: Prairie School




1919

Builder: RW Larsen

- Preservation Utah and KEEPYalecrest Award "Best Compatible Addition"
- 1 story sleeker more contemporary than Arts and Crafts
- Roof: shallow sloping hipped roof
- Smaller house size with
 Front or surrounding veranda
 Half-columns connecting roof to front veranda wall
 - Deep eaves faced with beadboard provide shaded porch
- Windows: horizontal fixed and multiple connecting double hung, casement
- Large, wide front doors
- High ceilings, open flowing floor plans

Prairie School





1916 Prairie School Bungalow Frank Lloyd Wright inspired Prairie School Bungalow

- Sleek rectilinear lines
- Roof: Multi-leveled roof line with large overhanging roof slabs
 Deep eaves faced with beadboard provides shade
- Windows: KEEPYalecrest Award for "Restoration of art glass windows"
- Materials: stucco
- High ceilings, large, wide front doors

Prairie School





1915 Jesse C Craig architect
Owner: HB Lamb 1925

- 2 story
- Roof: flat roof
- Deep shade-providing eaves faced with beadboard
- Front located half-columns connect roof to front veranda wall
- Decorative exterior elements
- Windows: casement, fixed
- High ceilings, large, wide front doors

English Tudor



1928 Builder: Herrick Bros

- 15% Yalecrest houses
- Second story often overhangs lower level (the "jetty") with corbels
- Roof shapes: complex gable
- Windows: Asymmetrical window placement
 Multiple connecting rectangular leaded windows
- Materials: Brick with lavish half timbering, stone
- Wooden doors (round & square tops) with decorative wrought iron

Colonial Revival



- 15% Yalecrest houses
- Roof shapes: gable, hipped, clip gable
- Window: Symmetrical window placement Double hung and Bay windows
- Pedimented doorways, porches, ± shutters
- Materials: All brick or brick with siding on side gables



1936 Cape Cod

- 1.5 story (2nd floor in under the eaves)
- Roof: gable, with 2-3 dormers on front face
- Windows: Symmetrical window placement
- Materials: striated brick with clapboard side siding

Colonial Revival

Georgian



1936 Georgian Colonial Revival John and Ophra Boyden House

Clipped Gabel roof with large overhang eave connected to multiple 2 story columns

Dutch





1926

Builder: Bowers Bldg

Dutch gambrel roof with flared front edges

French Norman





1932 Baronial French Norman
Builder/Contractor: Adolphus Eugene Christensen

- 9% of houses in Yalecrest
- Roof: steep gable with roofed towers (silos)
- Windows: Asymmetrical casement window placement
- Material: All brick with cast concrete and terra cotta detailing
 May have siding on gables, stucco
- Central chimneys

1929 Jacobean Revival 2 story Builder: Doxey-Layton

- 1, 1.5 and 2 stories
- Roof: steep gable
- Roofed tower cylindrical or octagonal (represent silos)
- Windows: Asymmetrical casement window placement
- Materials: All brick or brick with siding on gables, stucco
- Central chimneys

Minimal Traditional/Ranch



1945 Neoclassical porch

- ~13% of Yalecrest houses
- Post WWII, precursor to the 1960's Ranch
- 1 story with minimal ornamentation
 Offset front entrance
 Small entry porch
- Roof: shallow to med pitched gable or hipped with no eaves
- Windows: Asymmetrical window placement, fixed, double hung
- Material: all brick or brick with siding on gables

Spanish Colonial



1924


Builder: George Bowers



- <1% of houses in Yalecrest
- Roof: Low pitch red clay roof tiles wooden support beams,
- Windows: Few, small casement or tall double hung windows
- Materials: thick white stucco walls
- Little to no decoration, except tile work around entry doorway/passages
- Exterior or interior courtyards

Art Modern/Deco







1936, Glen/Mina Finlayson House Architect, owner

- Influenced by the European Bauhaus movement (WWI-1930's)
 Sleek linear lines (Rockefeller, Chrysler bldg. NYC)
 Curved exterior wall sections breaks up rectilinear main portions
- Roof: Flat roof
- Windows: low horizontal or tall narrow casement without windowsills, glass block, "vitaglass"
- Materials: stucco, reinforced concrete, Metal accents



International Art Deco







1941

Dal A Siegel House

- First truly international style ended with WWII

 Sleek, linear lines with arranged rectangular geometric forms broken up with

 curved ornamental elements or stylized shapes
- Roof: flat or shallow pitched hipped
- Windows: casement, glass block, vitaglass (enable ultraviolet light admission)
- Materials: brick, man-made substances: plastics, reinforced concrete
- Attached garages





Vitaglass

- the first ultraviolet ray glass one of the more curious products to emerge from the 1920s architectural glass industry.
- Enabled the invisible ultraviolet radiation of the sun to be admitted into the building
- Its refined chemistry promised to 'let health into the building' where ordinary soda-lime glass had blocked it out

Contemporary: "Butterfly Roof" house









- Donald B and Ruth C Ellison House
- A popular 1950-1970's off-shoot of earlier International Art style linear streamline design with minimal ornamentation
- Roof: Butterfly-shaped roof (gradual slope up on both ends)
 Deep eave overhangs with supporting beams
- Windows: fixed or horizontal sliding
- Materials: painted concrete blocks


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
